WOODSTOCK POLICE SERVICE BOARD

The Woodstock Police Service Board met on March 9, 2026 at Woodstock Police Service Headquarters and via ZOOM at 3:00 p.m.

Present were: Ken Whiteford, Provincial Appointee; Leslie Farrell, Provincial Appointee; Mayor Jerry Acchione, Council Representative; Connie Lauder, Council Representative; Daryl Stevenson, Community Appointee; and Kristin Barnim, WPSB EA.

Also in attendance were Chief Nick Novacich; and Jamie Taylor, Inspector. Kristi Lampman, Human Resources Coordinator; and David Tilley, Zone 4 Police Advisor joined via Zoom.

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Whiteford called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

6. BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

7. VERBAL REPORT FROM CHAIR

- Chair Whiteford confirmed that all Board members received his report from the 35th Annual Police Employment Conference hosted by the Police Association of Ontario on February 24th and 25th.
- Chair Whiteford reported that the budget presentation to City Council last Thursday went very well. He thanked Chief Novacich for preparing the slideshow and Inspector Taylor for assisting with the presentation.
- Chair Whiteford participated in the opening ceremonies for the Coldest Night of the Year walk on February 28th at College Avenue Secondary School and joined the organizers at Heart FM for a promotional interview session on February 23rd.

8. VERBAL REPORT FROM CHIEF

- On January 31st members of WPS held a Women in Policing Information Session. There was strong attendance and great engagement throughout the night. Chief Novacich thanked everyone who attended and helped make the event so successful.
- From January 30th to February 1st members of the WPS, alongside Special Olympics athletes visited community partners and first responders across Woodstock to share donuts and celebrate the #ChooseToInclude Donut Campaign. 100% of the proceeds supported Special Olympics Ontario. Chief Novacich thanked everyone who welcomed the WPS and continues to support inclusion, community, and local athletes.
- Chief Novacich acknowledged Black History Month, noting that February is a time to recognize and honour the achievements, resilience, and contributions of Black individuals throughout history and to reaffirm a commitment to equity, understanding, and inclusion.
- On January 31st, the WPS became aware of a road rage incident involving two drivers who were known to each other. One driver intentionally struck the other vehicle in the area of Highway 59 and Oxford Road 17. As a result of the investigation a 29-year-old male of Cambridge was charged with dangerous operation of a motor vehicle.

- On February 1st a WPS officer observed a vehicle travelling in excess of 100 kilometers per hour in the area of Highway 2 and 11th Line. A 21-year-old male of Hamilton was charged with stunt driving. His licence was suspended for 30 days and the vehicle was impounded for 14 days.
- On February 2nd WPS officers observed a vehicle travelling in the wrong lane in the area of Industrial Avenue. It was determined that the driver was operating the vehicle under suspension and the 37-year-old female of Woodstock was subsequently charged with driving while under suspension.
- On February 3rd the WPS responded to a motor vehicle collision in the area of Peel Street and Wilson Street. One of the involved drivers left the scene without providing his name or required information. Police located the involved vehicle a short time later and the driver, a 34-year-old male of Woodstock was charged with fail to remain and driving while under suspension.
- On February 5th WPS officers observed a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed in the area of Sixth Avenue and Mill Street. After an investigation, the driver, a 42-year-old male of Woodstock was charged with driving while under suspension, operating a motor vehicle without insurance and speeding. In a separate incident, police observed a parked vehicle on Dundas Street with a person appearing to be slightly slumped over in the driver's seat. Officers conducted a wellbeing check and through investigation and a Drug Recognition Expert evaluation it was determined that the driver, a 51-year-old male of Delhi was impaired by drugs. The male was charged with operation while impaired.
- On February 6th Woodstock Police Auxiliaries attended Handbags for Hospice where guests bid on amazing handbags during the auctions to raise funds in support of the important work of VON Sakura House Hospice. Chief Novacich thanked everyone who helped support local hospice care.
- On February 12th WPS assisted Brant County OPP in the arrest of an individual following a firearms-related incident. WPS thanks Brant County OPP for their continued partnership and coordinated response to ensure public safety.

- Chief Novacich advised of several recent fraud alerts, noting that scammers have been impersonating the Woodstock Crown Attorney's Office and City of Woodstock Employees.
- Chief Novacich recognized that February 22nd was National Human Trafficking Awareness Day which is observed annually to raise awareness of human trafficking and to promote action against this crime in Canada and around the world. The WPS is committed to this serious issue through our Special Victims Unit, which conducts investigations and community outreach to help people recognize the signs of human trafficking, protect themselves and their loved ones, and support victims.
- On February 28th Woodstock Police Team "Not Fast But Furious" participated in "Dodgeball for Danny" in collaboration with Conestoga students. Sixteen teams supported this amazing fundraiser in honour of Danny Holmes' memory, helping raise \$6,420 for the Shine Foundation's mission to make dreams come true for children facing severe physical disabilities.
- Also on February 28th Chair Whiteford, Mayor Acchione, Chief Novacich, Inspector Taylor and WPS Auxiliary joined in the Coldest Night of the Year walk.
- Chief Novacich acknowledged the passing of WPS dispatcher Trisha Musselman on March 1st 2026. Trisha served the Woodstock Police Service for 22 years. Condolences were extended to her family, friends, and colleagues.
- Chief Novacich also acknowledged that March 10th marks one year since the passing of WPS Constable Sziklai and noted that Constable Geertz was remembered on March 8th.
- Chief Novacich noted that the Service has lost three members over the past twelve months and encouraged members and staff to seek support if needed.

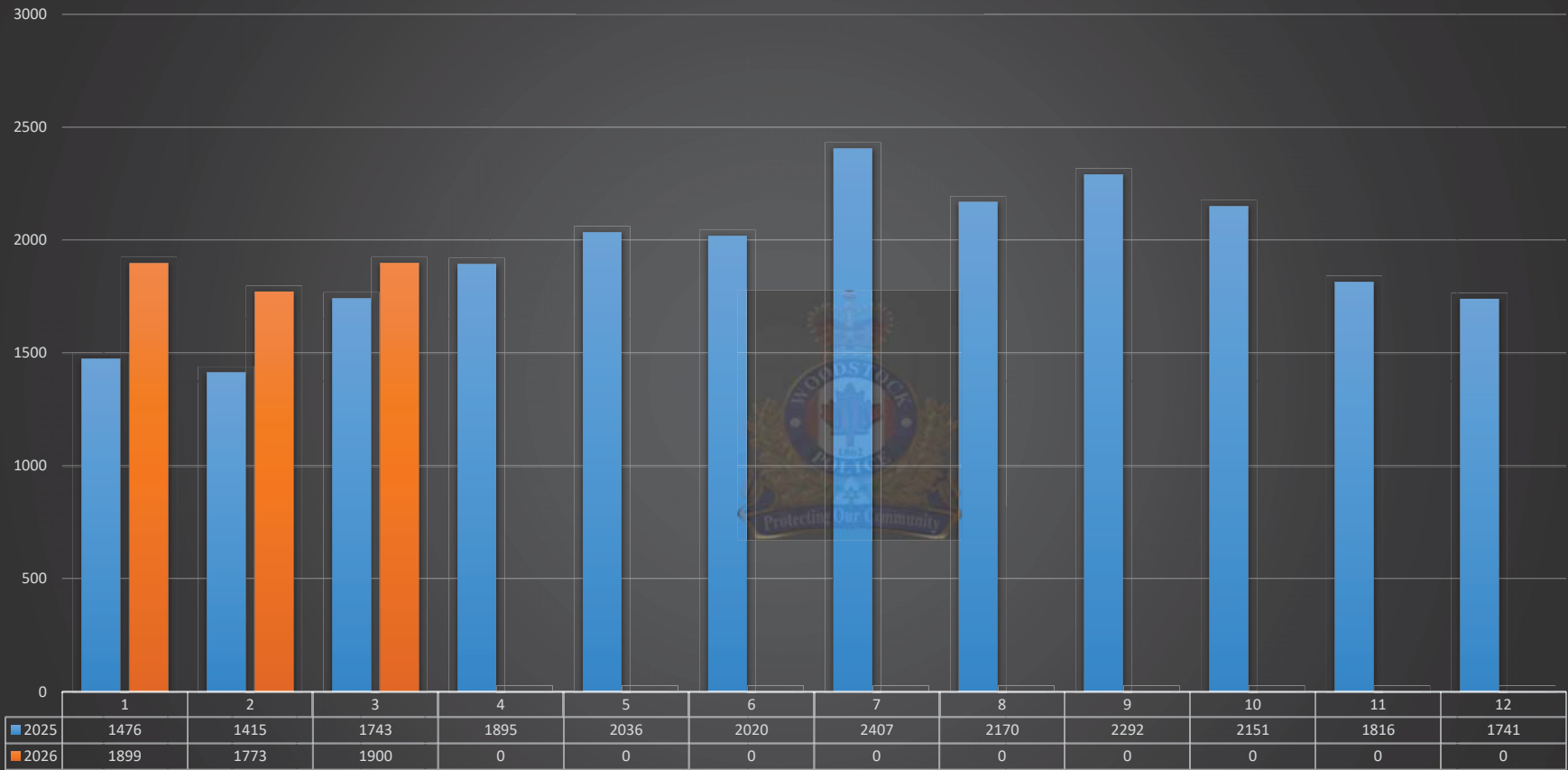

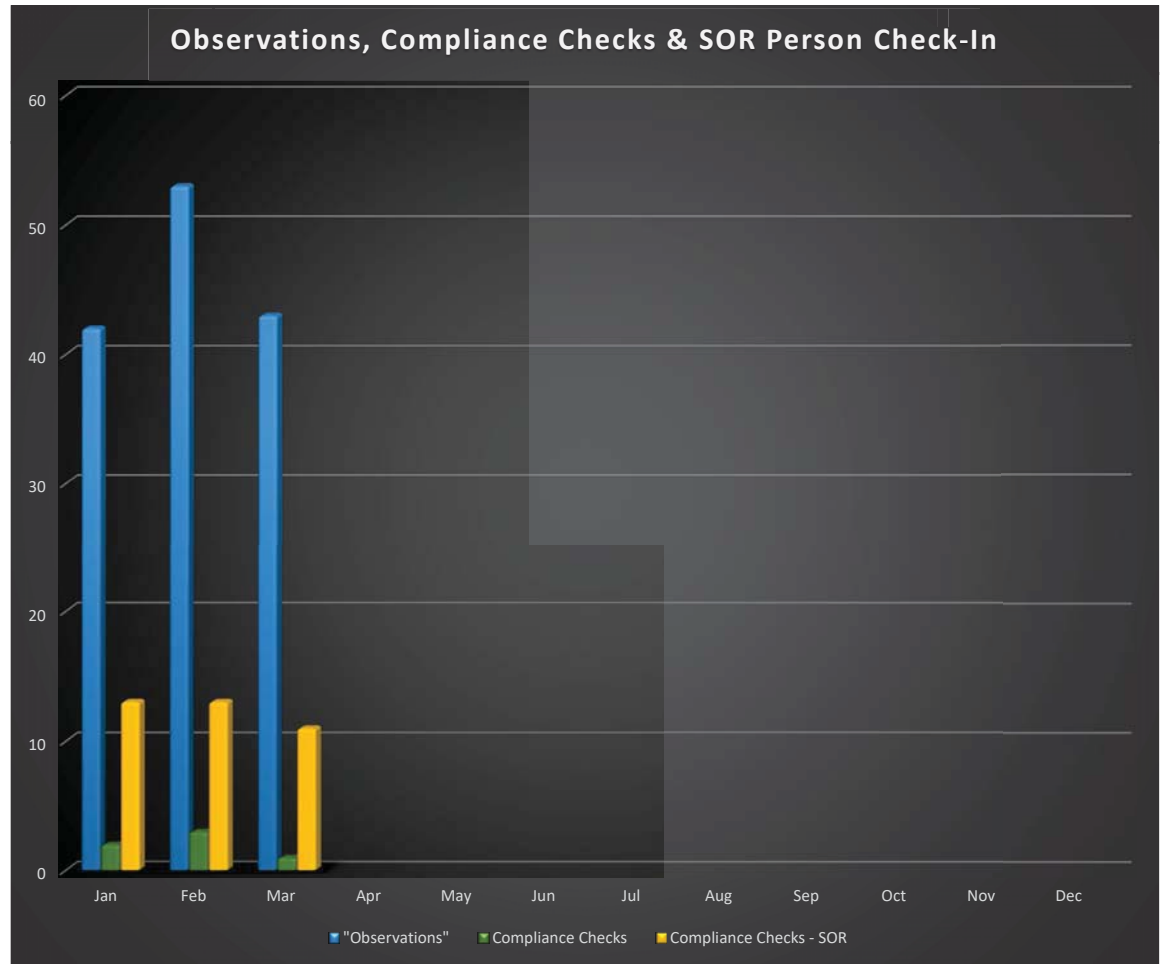

Board Report – April 13, 2026 - OPEN SESSION

RE: ***Request to WPSB for sponsorship to the PTSD Golf Tournament being held June 26, 2026***

Jason White is currently a serving member with Correctional Services Ontario. Jason has been a long time advocate for support to First Responders in relation to PTSD and Operational Stress Injuries. Jason's work has formed a partnership with the Boots on the Ground organization, which is a resource for First Responders that provide anonymous confidential peer support 24 hours a day, 7 days in the Province of Ontario. This is a charitable organization completely run and staffed by volunteers.

June 26th, 2026 a Golf Tournament will be hosted at Ingersoll Golf and Country Club. Any and all proceeds raised at this event will go directly to Boots on the Ground to support their program delivery.
